

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Preface

Health Care Financing – especially allocation and utilization of resources for different health care functions is becoming increasingly important in the backdrop of rapidly growing health care cost. National Health Accounts (NHA) is a substantive policy tool to decide the distribution of societal resources for health care as it provides the information on different aspects of total health expenditure,

and monitors the flow of funds at different levels. It is more important for countries like Bangladesh as we have been trying to optimize allocation and mobilize more funds in order to increase the

coverage with focus on efficiency and equity.

As a part of its regular work, Health Economics Unit (HEU) of Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) has conducted the BNHA (Round-IV) for the period 1997 – 2012 following the

Standard of Health Accounts (SHA) 2011.

The BNHA-IV report computed, compiled, and presented our national health expenditures in a systemic manner, reflected issues of resource allocation and mobilization and provided important

insights about the financing structure and the ways funds are managed in the HNP sector.

This Report has very significant policy implications, as it will help the policies to mobilize, allocate

and utilize public and private resources for health care. This initiative is taken at a very opportune moment as we are in the process of designing the next sector programme and many findings of the

BNHA (1997-2012) will be utilized as valuable inputs to policy planning and programme

development.

As the Health Economics Unit has made significant progress in institutionalizing NHA Process, it is expected that BNHA will be produced more frequently and with more analytical dimensions in the

near future.

Bangladesh National Health Accounts 1997 - 2012

Executive Summary

This report presents the results of the Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) 1997-2012. This round of BNHA has been developed and updated based on the System of Health Accounts (SHA) 2011 guidelines. It preserved the option of producing tables compatible to SHA 2001 manual for National Health Accounts. The BNHA framework used in the earlier rounds of NHA has been revised in this round (NHA4) through extensive consultations within the BNHA cell, and the guidance of an international NHA expert. New estimation methods and data sources have been used to improve private expenditure estimates. Revisions to the framework and classifications of health accounts have also been made.

NHA4 tracks the total health expenditure in Bangladesh between the fiscal years 1997 to 2012, cross-stratified and categorized by financing classifications, provider and function on an annual basis. Its main goal is to inform national policymakers and other stakeholders of the magnitude and profile of health spending. It also serves in institutionalizing monitoring of health outlays.

Adoption of SHA2011 introduces two new financing classifications that provide more specific answers to the questions: "where does the money come from?" and "what instruments are used for fund raising?" This new classification offers better interpretation of public and private funding in the health care sector.

Total Health Expenditure (THE)

Total health expenditure (THE) in Bangladesh is estimated at Taka 325.1 billion (\$4.1 billion) in 2012, Taka 153.9 billion (\$2.2 billion) in 2007, Taka 81.5 billion (\$1.4 billion) in 2002, and Taka 46.4 billion (\$1.1 billion) in 1997. In recent years THE grew at an annual average of around 14% in nominal terms. In real terms, the growth level has been approximately 8% annually.

THE as a percent share of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) has remained stable in recent years at around 3% In 2012, per capita spending on health was Taka 2,144 (\$27) compared to Taka 1,576 (\$16) in 2007 and Taka 825 (\$9) in 1997at 2012 constant price. The Purchasing Power Parity (PPP) adjusted per capita expenditure on health in nominal terms was Taka 5,384 (\$67) in 2012; in real terms it was Taka 2,144 (\$27) for that year.

Total Health Expenditure by Financing Classifications

A significant introduction under NHA4 is the disaggregation of all health spending according to:

- (i) Financing Schemes; and
- (ii) Revenue of Financing Schemes.

Health care financing schemes encompass major types of financing arrangements through which health services are paid for and obtained by households. These include direct payments by households as well as third-party financing arrangements, such as social health insurance and voluntary insurance. Revenues of Financing Schemes capture the revenue sources of individual financing schemes. Such information can be of critical importance to policy makers, especially in assessing the mix of public and private expenditures.

Households serve as the biggest financing scheme for Bangladesh healthcare system. In 1997 the share of households in THE was 56% (Taka 26 billion), which has risen to Taka 108 billion (\$1.6 billion) in 2007 to 63% (Taka 206 billion) in 2012. Government financing in THE (primarily offered through the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare) has increased significantly in absolute terms from Taka 17 billion in 1997 to Taka 42 billion in 2007 to Taka 75billion in 2012. As a percentage share of THE, public spending has declined from 37% in 1997 to 27% in 2007 to 23% in 2012.

Voluntary Health Insurance schemes are primarily in the form of spending to provide or reimburse medical care for employees of business entities. As a financing scheme, Voluntary Health Insurance Payment (NIPSH, Employers and Others) is5.25% of THE in 2012.

A cross classification of BNHA estimates between Financing Schemes and Revenue of the Schemes for 2012 shows that Non-profit Institutions Serving Households (NPISH) own contribution in health care services accounts for Taka 6 billion (approximately 2% of THE). Taka 27 billion direct assistance is given in 2012 to NGOs by the development partners, which is reflected in the Rest of World Financing Schemes (8.3% of THE) category.

Total Health Expenditure by Functional Classifications

According to the System of Health Accounts 2011 (SHA 2011) guidelines, health care functions imply the types of goods and services provided and activities performed within the health accounts boundary. Functional outlay refers to current spending on healthcare and relates to health care consumption; it excludes investment outlays. Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) boundary of functions is slightly different from the SHA 2011 as it includes expenditure on medical research, education and training. All health expenditures are categorized by core health care functions and include such activities as: curative care, rehabilitative and long-term care, medical goods, preventive care and health system and financing administration.

Disaggregation of expenditures by functional category shows that retail drugs and medical goods and services of curative care account for major share of THE. The share of retail drugs and medical goods and services has varied between 38% and 43% during 1997to 2012 period. Curative care services share of THE was 22% in 1997, 24% in 2007 and 26% in 2012. In 2012, Taka 134 billion (\$1.68 billion) was spent on retail drugs and medical goods and services; it was Taka 62 billion (\$0.9 billion) in 2007 and Taka 20 billion (\$0.5billion) in 1997.

Expenditure for services of curative care was Taka 83.5 billion (\$1 billion) in 2012. Capital formation includes both capital formation and depreciation, i.e., capital consumption of domestic healthcare provider institutions (excluding: retail sale and other providers of medical goods). Its share was around 5% of THE in 2012. The share of health education, training and research has varied between 1% to 4% during the 1997-2012 period.

There has been a steady increase in inpatient curative care expenditure over the years, both in absolute terms as well as relative to outpatient curative care outlays. In 1997, inpatient curative care constituted 42% of total curative care compared to 53% in 2007 and 49% in 2012. Outpatient curative care including dental services was 55% of total curative care in 1997, which declined to 47% in 2007 and maintaining the same share (47%) in 2012. General daycurative care offered primarily by public sector community clinics in rural areas has shown an increase in recent years. In 2012 it was around Taka 3.1 billion (3.8% of curative care) while such service was almost non-existent from 2002through 2009.

Regular ancillary services encompass such activities as laboratory and imaging. A total of Taka 17.8 billion was spent on ancillary services in 2012 compared to Taka 8 billion in 2007

and Taka 1.2 billion in 1997. The relative share of laboratory services has been declined from 60.1% in 1997 to 59.9% in 2007 and 57.1% in 2012.

In 2012 Taka 43.6 billion was spent on preventive care. Expenditure relating to maternal and child health and family planning and counselling activities collectively constitute approximately 83% of preventive care. Public awareness creations on health and hygiene issues are conducted both by the government and the NGO sector. In 2012 Taka 5 billion was incurred for awareness creation, which is 13% of total preventive care outlay. HIV/AIDS/STD related expenditure in 2012 was Taka 1.1 billion, which is 2.5% of total preventive care expenditure.

Total Health Expenditure by Provider Classifications

There are a wide range and types of healthcare providers in Bangladesh ranging from modern specialized tertiary level hospitals to unqualified practitioners. In this round of Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA), classifications of Healthcare Providers (HP) have been reclassified using System of Health Accounts 2011 (SHA 2011) guidelines. BNHA classifications of HP are now compatible to the SHA 2011 classifications of providers, and are capable of generating estimates by various categories of hospitals which are normally reported as general hospitals expenditure under SHA 2011.

Three types of provider account for most health expenditures:

- (i) drug outlets and medical goods retailers Taka 134 billion (41%);
- (ii) hospitals Taka 98 billion (30%) and
- (iii) providers of ambulatory health services Taka 49 billion (15%) of THE in 2012.

The share of expenditures accounted for drugs and medical goods retailers remained steady between 38% and 42% during the period 1997-2012. Hospitals' share of expenditures has also remained steady at around 30% of THE over the past ten years.

The increase in expenditures at hospitals as a share of all health spending has been considerable during the period 1997 – 2012. Overall hospital spending increased from Taka 11 billion (23% of THE) in 1997 to Taka 44 billion (29% of THE) in 2007 and Taka 98 billion (30% of THE) in 2012. This increase was mostly due to increase in expenditures in private hospitals.

Hospitals include general as well as teaching hospitals, mental health substance abuse institutions, and specialized hospitals. Although upazila and public hospitals below upazila-level continue to be major providers of health services in terms of outlays made at these entities, their relative share of overall hospital expenditures has declined from 34.1% (Taka 2.9 billion) in 1997 to 27.4% (Taka 4 billion) in 2001 and 24.1% (Taka 10.3 billion) in 2012.

Total expenditures at medical college hospitals were Taka 907 million in 1997 and Taka 2.2 billion in 2012. As a percent of total expenditure in hospitals, the share of medical ¹college hospitals was 5.2% in 2012. The share of total hospital expenditure at specialized hospitals was 3.4% and that of medical university and postgraduate institutes was 0.8% in 2012.

Private and NGO hospitals in particular have grown in number over the past decade, coupled with the entry of a handful of large-scale, tertiary level private healthcare facilities (e.g. Apollo, United, Square, Ahasnia Cancer Hospital) in Dhaka city. Expenditure at Private and NGO hospitals in 2012 was Taka 69 billion, which constitutes 70.4% of total outlays on hospital services. In 2007 and 1997 total expenditure at Private and NGO hospitals were Taka 26 billion and Taka 3 billion respectively.

Ambulatory healthcare providers are primarily involved in providing services directly to outpatients who do not require inpatient care. It includes outpatient services offered by physicians, and family planning centres. The major providers in this group are general physicians and ambulatory health care centres. A total of Taka 49 billion was spent on such services in 2012. The relative share of general physicians have declined from 49% in 1997 to 39% in 2007 and 37% in 2012 while that of ambulatory health care centres have increased from 36% in 1997 to 50% in 2007 and 46% in 2012.

There has been a structural shift in major metropolitan cities whereby more qualified and specialized physicians offer their services from outpatient health care centres than from retail drug outlets or their residence. During the 1997–2012 period, the share of providers of ambulatory healthcare ranged between 13% and 16% of THE. Expenditures on public health programs, primarily administered by the MOHFW, witnessed considerable variations. It declined from Taka 4.4 billion in 1997 to Taka 2.3 billion in 2007 followed by a steady increase to Taka 6 billion in 2012. As a percent of THE, their share in 2012 was 2%

compared to 10% in 2002 and 13% in 1997.

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) is the lead institution in conducting public health programs in Bangladesh. In 2012 Taka 6 billion was spent by the ministry under this activity, which constituted 82% of total public health program outlay. The role of NGOs too is significant, and their share was 17% (Taka 1.3 billion) in 2012. The involvement of government entities outside MOHFW is relatively nominal, incurring around Taka 61 million in 2012 for promotion of public health activities.

Out-of-pocket Expenditure by Households

Out of pocket health expenditure by households (OOP) constitutes the major component of total health spending in Bangladesh. Households spend over Taka 205 million annually on health related goods and services. OOP share in THE has increased from 55.9% in 1997 to 59.9% in 2005 to 63.3% in 2012. A functional breakdown of services suggests that outlay on medical goods comprises the biggest share of OOP. In 2012, households spent Taka 134 million on pharmaceutical drugs. Expenditure on drugs as a percentage of OOP however has declined over time. In 1997, drug outlay was 75.3% of OOP, 70.5% in 2001 and 65% in 2012. In 2012, Taka 44.8 million was spent on curative care, and Taka 17.8 million on ancillary services. Ancillary services are classified into such groups as laboratory services, imaging and so forth.

The relative share of inpatient curative care expenditure steadily increased during 1997 to 2004 period, and stabilized at around 11% subsequently; in 2012 it is 14%. The increase in inpatient curative care spending is justified due to a combination of higher OOP in private hospitals and greater propensity to use private sector facilities.

Total Health Expenditure by Geographical Classifications

The percentage distribution of healthcare spending by geographical region has not changed much between 1997 and 2012, except for Dhaka and Chittagong divisions. In 2012, health expenditure in Dhaka division was Taka 133 billion translating to 41% of total spending. Dhaka's share was 35% of THE In 2007 whileit was 28% in 1997. In 1997, health expenditure in Chittagong division accounted for 27%, a share that has decreased to 21% in 2007 to 18% in 2012. The main reason for this shift is due to faster increase in private sector health spending as well as investment in Dhaka division. The relative shares are much lower in Sylhet and Barisal, and have changed little.

In 2012, Dhaka division had the highest per capita spending of Taka 2,722 followed by Khulna (Taka 2,371) and Chittagong (Taka 1,930). The lowest per capita spending was in Sylhet division (Taka 1,379). During the period 1997 – 2006 Chittagong division had the highest per capita spending. Barisal, Rangpur and Sylhet had relatively lower per capita expenditure than the other four divisions.

As a percentage share of total government spending on health, in 2012, Dhaka (26%) and Chittagong (18%) are higher and lower in Barisal (8%) and Sylhet (7%). Per capita government outlay however is lowest in Dhaka division – Taka 396 while Chittagong division is the next lowest (Taka 464). Barisal division has the highest per capita public spending (Taka 668) followed by Khulna (Taka 631).

Bangladesh National Health Accounts 1997-2012

1. Introduction

In Bangladesh health services are provided by the public and the private sectors. The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) is the dominant public sector provider and key policy maker and regulator. The private sector providers are primarily for profit entities, with non-profit organizations (NGOs) also offering a wide array of preventive and curative services.

Bangladesh is one of the most densely populated countries in the world, and has enjoyed a steady respectable annual economic growth of 5% to 6% for more than a decade. The incidence of poverty has declined considerably. With a large population base and an increasing per capita income, the demand for both public and private sector health services have been increasing. Improved road communications too have made access to peri-urban and urban health facilities much easier. On the supply side, both public and private sector investment in health facilities have been increasing, which has been most pronounced amongst a few large sized privately owned and operated hospitals in the metropolitan cities of the country.

Since 1997, the Health Economics Unit (HEU) of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare of the Government of Bangladesh have been instrumental in periodically producing the country's National Health Accounts (NHA). This report presents the findings of the fourth round of Bangladesh NHA providing estimates for the 1997-2012 period. NHA, following widely internationally accepted guidelines, provides a systematic description of financial flows related to health. It provides health expenditure estimates by financing schemes, type of services (functions), and by providers of these services for a given period. NHA estimate are policy relevant. It reflects the growth of the health system, providing insights on policy reform efforts that are linked to attaining the Millennium Development Goals (MDG) as well as Universal Health Coverage (UHC). Policy makers and researchers can objectively assess the trends in allocation of resources for health services by the key stakeholders – households, government and development partners.

1.1. NHA in Bangladesh

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) initiated work on development of national health accounts for Bangladesh in 1997 with funding support from the Asian Development Bank (ADB). During the first phase of NHA development a conceptual framework for Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) was formulated, and the first estimates of national health spending developed. The first national health accounts estimates (NHA1) were for the fiscal year 1996-97, and was published in 1998 (Data International, 1998).

During 2003 to 2004, the Health Economics Unit (HEU) of MOHFW with financial assistance from Department for International Development(DFID)supported production of new estimates (NHA2), which covered the period 1996-97 – 2001-02 (Data International, 2003). During this second round, the BNHA framework was updated and made compatible with the System of Health Accounts (SHA), which was the statistical framework recommended by World Health Organization (WHO).

The third round of BNHA (referred to as NHA3) provided estimates of health expenditure in Bangladesh for the 1997 – 2007 period. NHA3 was linked to the SHA framework (OECD, 2000), and used classifications based on the SHA's International Classification for Health Accounts (ICHA). HEU with financial assistance from the German Technical Corporation (GIZ) commissioned the study.

Through the collaborative efforts of Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), the World Health Organization (WHO), and Eurostat, A System of Health Accounts 2011 (SHA 2011) has been produced. SHA 2011 builds on the original OECD Manual 2000 and the Guide to Producing National Health Accounts. It is viewed that countries following SHA 2011 will produce NHA estimates that will be comparable across countries, and more policy relevant.

The fourth round of BNHA used SHA 2011 extensively as a guide. The revised BNHA framework relied considerably on the earlier versions of the BNHA framework developed particularly under NHA31997-2007 and SHA 2011.

A BNHA cell was established in the Health Economics Unit (HEU) of MOHFW in 2012. The BNHA cell was instrumental in facilitating data collation and primary data collection. The BNHA cell was actively involved in data editing, and data analysis. The team members worked closely with an international NHA expert in conceptualizing definitional issues conforming to SHA 2011 and linking them to BNHA framework. In addition, concerted effort was expended in introducing best practice estimation techniques.

1.2. Organization of the Report

This round of BNHA (NHA4) presents national health expenditure estimates by financing schemes and revenue of financing schemes, by functional use, by provider and by geographical classification. These estimates are presented using both BNHA and SHA classifications. Whilst estimates for 1997–2012 are included in this report, much of the discussion is on the most recent year results, i.e., 2012. The report also highlights trends in expenditure patterns by financing source, provider, function and region.

Following a brief introduction (Section 1), Section 2 presents the overall THE findings. It discusses THE's share of GDP, and the changes over the 1997-2012 period. NHA4 introduces financing schemes and revenue of financing scheme concepts. Section 3 analyses THE by financing classification. Expenditure by types of services or functions is presented in Section 4. Section 5 presents estimates from the perspective of different types of private and public providers of healthcare services. THE disaggregated at the seven administrative divisions of Bangladesh appear in Section 6. Household Out of Pocket (OOP) expenditure in healthcare is discussed in Section 7. A discussion on revisions in NHA estimates for 1997-2007 is presented in Section 8. Factors contributed to the variation in estimates compared to NHA3 are highlighted.

This report includes two annexes. A set of detailed statistical tables by BNHA classification and also by System of Health Accounts (SHA2011) for the 1997–2012 periods appear in Annex I. An overview of the BNHA framework adopted for NHA4 is presented in Annex II.

2. Total Health Expenditure

National Health Accounts (NHA) historically has been presented on a three-dimensional classification system - International Classification for Health Accounts (ICHA), which had three axes: healthcare financing (ICHA-HF), healthcare functions (ICHA-HC) and healthcare service providers (ICHA-HP). The System of Health Accounts (SHA) 2011 suggests revisions and inclusion of different concepts, definitions, and estimation procedures. Notwithstanding those revisions, SHA 2011 introduced four additional dimensions to the NHA framework: (i) Classification of Health Care Financing Schemes (HF); (ii) Classification of Revenues of Health Care Financing Schemes (FS); (iii) Classification of Factors of Health Care Provision (FP) and (iv) Capital Formation in Health System (HK). All four additions are significantly policy relevant.

Earlier rounds of Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) were based on System of Health Accounts 2001 guideline (SHA1). Adopting SHA2011 in this round of BNHA has increased the scope of analysis and provides better interpretation and insights on public and private funding in the health care sector.BNHAhavealsoopted for a level of aggregation and disaggregation in the reporting as required for itspolicy analysis and depending on the feasibility related to data and resource constraints. A comparison between SHA2011 and BNHA key definitions are provided in Table 1.

Healthcare Financing Classifications

The structure and transactions of the health financing system under SHA 2011 comprises three components (i) financing schemes - the financing arrangements (e.g. social health insurance, voluntary insurance) through which health care goods and services are purchased (ii) financing agent - the institutional units (e.g. ministry of health, local government, private insurance companies) that manage/operate the financing schemes and (iii) revenue of the - the types of transaction (e.g. scheme government transfer from domestic revenues. transfers from foreign donors, social insurance contributions) through which the financing schemes obtain their revenues.

Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) has adopted the SHA 2011 definition and classification for financing. Alike SHA2011, BNHA framework allows measurement of expenditure of health care financing schemes and the types of revenues of the health care financing schemes.

Healthcare Function Classifications

According to System of Health Accounts 2011 (SHA2011) guideline, health care functions imply the types of goods and services provided and activities performed within the health accounts boundary. Functional outlay refers to current spending on health care and therefore relates to consumption and excludes investment outlays.

Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) boundary of functions slightly differs from SHA2011. BNHA treats all recurrent expenditure on medical research, education, training and capital investments as part of healthcare function and therefore, reports them as separate items under functional classification.

Capital Formation in Health System

According to SHA 2011 "Gross fixed capital formation in the health care system is measured by the total value of the fixed assets that health providers have acquired during the accounting period (less the value of the disposals of assets) and that are used repeatedly or continuously for more than one year in the production of health services."

The definitions for Capital Formation in health for Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) are no different from SHA 2011. Although BNHA includes capital formation within the healthcare system as part of its functions but preserves the provisions of generating separate estimates for Capital Formation

same as SHA 2011. In classifying various HP, BNHA has introduced sub-classification within the SHA 2011 classifications of HP. Incorporation of sub-classification have enriched BNHA-HP to estimate expenditures by various categories of hospitals which are normally reported as "General Hospital Expenditure" under SHA2011. For example, BNHA can provide breakdown in expenditure by specific categories of medical hospitals (e.g. medical college hospitals, Upazila Health Complexes), while under SHA2011 a entitled broad category general hospital expenditure is used.

Classification of Factors of Health Care Provision

Factors of provision are defined in SHA2011 as the valued inputs used in the process of provision of health care. It includes labour, capital and materials and external services – to provide health care goods and services. It refers not only to health-specific resources but also to the non-health specific inputs needed to generate health services.

Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) has adopted the same definition and classification for factors of provision as defined in SHA2011.

2.1. Trends in Total Health Expenditure

Total health expenditure(THE) in Bangladesh is estimated at Taka 325.1 billion (\$4.1billion) in 2012, Taka 153.9 billion (\$2.2 billion) in 2007, Taka 81.5 billion (\$1.4 billion) in 2002 and Taka 46.4 billion (\$1.1billion) in 1997 (Table 2and Figure 1). In recent years THE grew at an annual average of around 14% in nominal terms. In real terms, the growth level has been approximately 8% annually. Unlike SHA, THE estimation under BNHA is inclusive of capital expenditure. The absolute value as well as growth in THE for Bangladesh is understandably lower under SHA definition of THE.


In real terms, overall health expenditure more than tripled between 1997 and 2012, from Taka 101 billion to Taka 325 billion in 2012 (constant 2012 prices). In real terms, the annual increase ranged between 3% (2003) and 14% (2001). Average growth rate for the period of 1998-2012 is around 8%

2.2. Health Expenditure in Relation to GDP and Population

Total Health Expenditure(THE) as a percent share of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) has remained stable in recent years 3% in 2004 and 3.5% in 2012 (Table 3,Figure 2). The ratio of health expenditure to GDP provides an indication of the proportion of overall economic activity accounted for by the health sector. Even when the average expenditure on health per person does not change, THE will increase as the population grows. Hence, estimates of per capita health expenditure remove the influence of changes in overall size of the population from the analysis.

In 2012, per capita spending on health was Taka 2,144 (\$27) compared to Taka 1,447 (\$15) in 2007 and Taka 792 (\$9) in 1997 (Table 4). Real growth in per capita THE show marked variation in recent years – 2.4% in 2012, 7.4% in 2011 and 10.4% in 2010. The variation happened primarily due to investment outlays in the health sector and an increase in use of General Day Curative Care and Imaging Services. Table 4 includes SHA defined THE estimates, that excludes capital expenditure. The growth in per capita THE based on SHA 2011 definition is 5.6% in 2012, 9% in 2011 and 10.5% in 2010.

The difference between GDP and THE growth rates is primarily the consequence of growth in the overall size of the Bangladesh population. Per capita health expenditures and per capita GDP over time show that the former increased at a higher pace than the latter (Figure 2).

2.3. Health Expenditure in Purchasing Power Parity (PPP) Terms

Cost of living varies between economies, and the relative exchange rate does not necessarily account fully the differences. Such factors as the presence of non-tradable (between countries) goods or services preclude a simple conversion of currencies. Hence, it warrants the need for a process, which accounts for these differences and provides an equivalent conversion of currencies. The calculation of Purchasing Power Parity (PPP) achieves this goal. The Purchasing Power Parity (PPP) adjusted per capita expenditure on health in nominal terms was Taka 5,384 (\$67) in 2012 (Table 5).

2.4. International Comparisons

The World Bank's, *World Development Indicators: Health Systems*, (http://wdi.worldbank.org/table/2.15) presents per capita health expenditure for various countries. Notwithstanding differences in inter-country estimation procedures, **Table 6**provides THE as share of GDP and per capita health expenditure for selected countries for 2012. The table also includes per capita health expenditure adjusted for Purchasing Power Parity (PPP). Bangladesh's per capita THE of \$27 is lowest amongst the selected countries. Per capita THE for India, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka are \$61, \$36, \$39 and \$89 respectively. Thailand and Malaysia's per capita THE are \$215 and \$410 respectively. In

PPP terms, Bangladesh's per capita THE is \$64 while that of India, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka are \$157, \$80, \$91, and \$189 respectively.



Inter-country comparison of selected countries on public and private health expenditure reveals that share of public outlay is lower in Bangladesh. Of total THE, public expenditure is 23% while that of India, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka are 33%, 40%, 31% and 40% respectively. Thailand and Malaysia's share of public health expenditure are 76% and 55% (Figure 3)

3. THE by Financing Classifications

A rich introduction under NHA4 is the disaggregation of all health spending according to: (i) Financing Schemes (HF); and (ii) Revenue of Financing Schemes (FS). Each of these two categories is disaggregated into three groups: (i) public, (ii) private, and (iii) Rest of the World (ROW). ROW includes all foreign development partners' expenditure excluding funding directly provided to the Government of Bangladesh by them. It should be noted that when a government activity is financed by external partners and subsequently used by the former to directly finance services, these expenditures are classified as public outlays. This approach is consistent with System of Health Accounts 2011 (SHA 2011) guidelines.

Financing Schemes (FS) of Bangladesh can be classified into four broad categories: (i) government schemes; (ii) Non-Profit Institutions Serving Households (NPISH) schemes; (iii) Rest of the World (ROW) schemes; and (iv) household financing schemes.

Under government schemes, healthcare services are provided, managed and delivered by public entities, with the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare being the dominant one. In instances where the government contracts out to a service provider, for example to a NGO, but plays an active role in fund disbursement and program monitoring, it is treated as a government scheme.

Funds spent by the NGOs in healthcare service delivery are primarily generated from foreign development partners and from NGO's own source. Funds that are generated by the NGOs from its own source are classified as NPISH schemes.

NGOs receiving direct funds from development partners under a contractual arrangement are termed as "Rest of the World" schemes. A NGO may receive solicited (e.g. by submitting a proposal)funding from a donor agency by signing a contract whereby they remain obligated to certain deliverables and financial reporting, are classified as a Rest of the World scheme. In Bangladesh many donor agencies develop programmes or activities on their own, and implement them through international or local NGOs.

Household financing scheme is relatively easy to define as it is the direct payment made by households for healthcare services. Out-of-pocket expenditure made by households for healthcare services is classified as household financing scheme.

3.1. General Trends

Households serve as the biggest financing scheme for Bangladesh healthcare system. In 1997 the share of household in THE was 56% (Taka 26 billion), which has risen to 63% (Taka 206 billion) in 2012 (Table 7, Figure 4). Government financing in THE primarily offered through the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW), has declined from 37% in 1997 to 27% in 2007 and 23% in 2012. However, government spending in healthcare enjoyed a steady increase in absolute terms over the years. In 1997 government spending on healthcare was Taka 17 billion which increased to Taka 42 billion in 2007 to Taka 75billion in 2012.

Development partners contribute a sizeable amount of their assistance through the government or through NGOs. Funds provided to the government are embedded in the government expenditure estimates while direct assistance given to NGOs is reflected in the Rest of the World Financing Schemes. In 1997 contribution from Rest of the World financing schemes was Taka 2.7 billion (6% of THE) which has grown to 11.5 Taka in 2007 and Taka 27 billion (8% of THE) in 2012 (Table 7).

Apart from providing services funded by the Rest of the World (ROW), NGOs also provide healthcare services from its own fund which is classified as "Non Profit Institution Serving Household (NPISH) Financing Schemes". In 1997 NPISH Financing Schemes accounted for Taka 0.46 billion which has increased more than 12 times in the last 15 years, reaching 5.7 billion 2012 (Table 7). However, despite significant increases over the years, NPISH own contribution in THE has remained around 2%in 2012. ROW do not provide any direct healthcare services but relies on the NPISH and their combined contribution in the healthcare is around 9% of THE (Figure 4).


Corporations, autonomous bodies and private companies (excluding health insurance), comprise a modest 3%share of THE in 2012 in terms of health financing (Table 7). Share of autonomous bodies and private companies jumped from 2% of THE in 2007 to 5% in 2008. It may be mentioned that government offered tax incentives for investment in healthcare may have contributed increases in expenditure by corporations, autonomous bodies and private companies in 2005 and 2008. This phenomenon continued till 2011 which kept their share in THE at around 4%. Readymade garments, tea gardens and large corporations are major contributors in this type of financing schemes. Healthcare benefits offered under these schemes are limited to their employees and their families.

A further extension of the discussion on health care financing scheme is the classification of revenue of financing schemes. Classifying revenue by schemes allows tracking of methods applied in revenue-raising and permits identification of institutions that are involved in the process. This exercise allows understanding the respective role and share of the public and private financing.

A cross classification of BNHA estimates between financing schemes and revenue of the schemes for 2012 shows that healthcare services provided by the government accounts for Taka 75 billion, Households Taka 206 billion and Rest of the World Taka 27 billion. NGOs own contribution in healthcare services for 2012 was around Taka 6 billion which is approximately 2% of the THE (Table 8).





Figure 5: Growth in Revenue of the Financing Schemes, 1997-2012

A trend of revenue of the financing schemes shows that healthcare expenditure in Bangladesh is increasingly becoming more dependent on domestic revenue which is largely financed by the households (Figure 5). Government and households have always been the two major source of financing for healthcare in Bangladesh. The gap between this two major sources of revenue for healthcare is widening at a higher rate since 2007. Large scale investment by private companies in healthcare is the main contributor for widening this gap.

Financing agents include institutions that pool health resources collected from different sources, as well as entities, such as households and firms that pay directly for health care from their own resources. Financing agents are typically grouped into two mutually exclusive institutional sectors: (i) Public and (ii) Private. In 2012 healthcare expenditure directly paid by the public sector is Taka 75 billion while it is Taka 251 billion by the private sector as a financing agent (Figure 6).

BNHA reporting of public outlays using financing agent classification generally report a higherpublic expenditure than what actually the government spends. This is due to the definitional difference between funding source and financing agent. For example, public expenditure in 2012 according to financing agent is Taka 75.1 billion which is around Taka 100 million higher than what we would be the estimate under the financing agent classification. As a financing agent public sector share has declined from 35% in 1997 to 23% of THE in 2012.





4. THE by Functional Classification

According to the System of Health Accounts 2011 (SHA2011) guidelines, healthcare functions imply the types of goods and services provided and activities performed within the health accounts boundary. Functional outlay refers to current spending on healthcare and therefore relates to consumption and excludes investment outlays. Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) boundary of functions is slightly different for the SHA2011 and it includes expenditure on medical research, education and training.

Apart from the inclusion of medical research, education and training, BNHA classification of functions remain consistent with the SHA 2011 approach. All health care expenditures are categorized by core healthcare functions and include such activities as: curative care, rehabilitative and, long-term care, medical goods, preventive care, health system and financing administration.

4.1. General Trends

Disaggregation of expenditures by functional category shows that retail drugs and medical goods services and curative care services account for the major shares of THE. The shareof retail drugs and medical goods services has ranged between 38% in 2004 to 43% in 1998 (Table 10). Curative care services share of THE was 22% in 1997 and 26% in 2012.

In 2012, Taka 134 billion (\$1.68 billion) was spent onretail drugs and medical goods services; it was Taka 62 billion (\$0.9 billion) in 2007 and Taka 19.7 billion (\$0.46 billion) in 1997 (Table 10). Expenditure for services of curative care was Taka 83.5 billion (\$1.4 billion) in 2012. A look at trends in curative care expenditure shows that it has increased significantly during the period between 2002and 2012. In 2002 expenditure of curative care services was Taka 19 billion which increased to Taka 43 billion in 2008 and almost doubled by 2012 (Taka 84 billion) (Figure 7).

Prevention and public health services include maternal and child health, family planning and awareness programs. It constitutes around 13% of THE in 2012. Capital formation includes both capital formation and depreciation, i.e., capital consumption of domestic healthcare provider institutions (excluding: retail sale and other providers of medical goods). Its share was around 5% of THE in 2012. The share of health education, training and research has varied between 1% to 3% during the 1997-2012 period (Table 13).

Figure 7: Trends in Healthcare Functions, 1997-2012





Figure 8: THE by Functional Classification, 2012



4.2. Services of Curative Care

There has been a steady increase in inpatient curative care expenditure over the years, both in absolute terms as well as relative to outpatient curative care outlays. In 1997, inpatient curative care constituted 42% of total curative care compared to 49% in 2012 (Table 11). Outpatient curative care including dental services was 55% of total curative care in 1997, which declined to 47% in 2012. Outpatient curative care offered primarily by public sector community clinics in rural areas has shown an increase in 2011 and 2012. In 2012 it was around Taka 3.1 billion (3.8% of curative care) while such service was non-existent during 2002 to 2009 period. In the late 1990s the government did offer such service, as evident from the expenditure estimates in Table 11.

Services of curative care in Bangladesh are dominated by General Inpatient and Outpatient care provided through public and private hospitals and ambulatory services. Ambulatory services include government outpatient centres (for example, community clinics) and general physicians having private practice outside hospitals. In 2012 government spending in curative care services was Taka 26.7 billion which is around 32% of total curative care services. Out of the Taka 26.7 billion, Taka 13 billion (16% of total curative care) is spent on General

Inpatient Care and Taka 7.7 billion (9% of total curative care) on Outpatient care. In 2007 government share in General Inpatient Care was around 30% (Taka 11.2 billion) and 55% (Taka 5.8 billion) in 1997. Government share in General Inpatient Care was around 25% (Taka 2.6 billion) and 22% (Taka 2.3) in outpatient care. Curative care services especially inpatient curative cares in rural Bangladesh is dominated by government service providers. Such services are provided for free or at a nominal price.

4.3. Regular Ancillary Services

Regular ancillary services encompass such activities as laboratory and imaging. A total of Taka 17.8 billion was spent on ancillary services in 2012 compared to Taka 8 billion in 2007 and Taka 1.2 billion in 1997 (Table 18). The findings suggest that ancillary services have grown significantly over the years. The relative share of laboratory services has declined from 60.1% in 1997 to 57.1% in 2012.

4.4. Expenditure on Medicine and Medical Goods

Expenditure on medicine and medical goods comprise the largest functional component under THE. Medicine sold through retail drug outlets is the key functional activity, constituting almost all of the total outlay (more than 99%). Eye glasses, hearing aids and orthopaedic aids collectively comprise less than 0.5% of total outlay under the medicine and medical goods classification (Table 14). However, installation of contact lenses, hearing aid or any artificial orthopaedic devices using hospital services are not included under this category according to NHA definition. Such outlays are reported under hospital or specialized hospital categories.

Government expenditure on medicine and medical goods are not accounted in the estimates of medicine and medical goods as per SHA definition. Such outlays are treated as inputs of hospital services. However, when a patient is admitted in a government hospital but buying medicine from a retail drug outlet then cost of the medicine is captured in the sales of medicine by such entities.

4.5. Expenditure on Preventive Care

In 2012 Taka 43.6 billion was spent on preventive care (Table 15). Expenditure relating to maternal and child health and family planning and counselling activities collectively constitute approximately 83% of preventive care. Public awareness creations on health and hygiene issues are conducted both by the government and the NGO sector. In 2012 Taka 5 billion was incurred for awareness creation, which is 12% of total preventive care outlay. HIV/AIDS/STD related expenditure in 2012 was Taka 1.1 billion, which is 2.5% of total preventive care expenditure. Expenditure under the immunization program is included under the "other preventive care services" category. In 2012 total expenditure on immunization program was Taka 0.43 billion.

The Government of Bangladesh remain the major financer of preventive care services. In 2012 it spent around Taka 27 billion on preventive care, which translate to 61% (Table 16) of the total expenditure of preventive care. Preventive services provided by the NGOs are funded through its own revenue generation schemes and donations from development partners categorised as Rest of the World (ROW). In 2012, NGOs spent Taka 16.8 billion on preventive care of which Taka 3 billion was from their own resources and Taka13.8 billion was externally financed by ROW.

A cross tabulation of healthcare services by financing schemes shows that government spending in 2012 on the services of the curative care was around Taka 27 billion. This translates to 32% of total curative care spending in 2012 while household share was 54% and Rest of the World 10% (Table 17). Although government accounts for only 23% of THE, services like rehabilitative care, long term care, research and training are entirely dependent on government financing schemes. Government contributions on preventive care are also significant. In 2012 public outlay was around Taka 27 billion which was 61% of total preventive care expenditure. Non-profit Institutions Serving Households (NPISH) and Rest of the World (ROW) spent Taka 3.2 billion and Taka 13.8 billion respectively on preventive care activities.

In 2012 total expenditure on ancillary services was Taka 17.8 billion. Taka 134 billion was spent on medicine and medical goods, which were entirely financed by households (Table 17Table 17). It needs to be mentioned that ancillary services, medicine and medical goods provided by the government hospitals are included in the hospital services classification and not under these services. Gross capital formation in healthcare system for 2012 was Taka 16.3 billion of which government invested Taka 6.7 billion (41%) and the remaining 59% was by private companies.

5. THE by Provider Classifications

There are a wide range and types of healthcare providers in Bangladesh ranging from modern specialized tertiary level hospitals to quack doctors. In this round of Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA), classifications of Healthcare Providers (HP) have been reclassified using System of Health Accounts 2011 (SHA2011)guideline. BNHA classifications of HP are now compatible to the SHA2011 classifications of providers, and also capable of generating estimates by various categories of hospitals which are reported as general hospitals expenditure underSHA2011.

5.1. General Trends




Figure 9: Trends in Healthcare Provider Expenditure, 1997-2012

Three types of provider account for most health expenditures: (i) drug outlets and medical goods retailers Taka 134 billion (41%);(ii) hospitals Taka 98 billion (30%) and (iii) ambulatory health careproviders Taka 49 billion (15%) of THE in 2012 (Table 18). The share of expenditures accounted for drugs and medical goods retailers remained steady between 38% and 42% during the period 1997-2012. Hospitals' share of expenditures has also remained steady at around 30% of THE over the past ten years (Table 21, Figure 9).

Ambulatory services primarily include outpatient services offered by physicians, community clinics and family planning centres. During the 1997–2012 period, expenditure by ambulatory healthcare provider ranged between 13% and 16% of THE. Expenditures on public health programs, primarily administered by the MOHFW, witnessed a decline from the late 1990s in both nominal terms and as a share of THE (Table 18). As a percent of THE, their share in 2012 was 2%, down from 10% in 2002 and 13% in 1997

Share of providers of ancillary services remained around 5% since 2003. Ancillary service comprising pathological test and imaging services availed from non-hospital facilities accounts for Taka 17.8 billion in 2012 (Table 18). In 1997 total value of ancillary services was Taka 1.2 billion which is 2.6% of THE and Taka 8 billion in 2007 or 5% of THE. Expenditure on public health programs, primarily administered by the MOHFW remained between Taka 6 to 8 billion since 1997 implying a decline in its share of THE. In 1997 total public health program expenditure was Taka 6.2 billion which is 13.4% of THE, has declined to 7.2% (Taka 6.3 billion) in 2003 and 2.3% (Taka 7.4 billion) in 2012. Expenditures of provider of medicine and medical goods, hospital and ambulatory services have grown at a higher rate compared to other types of service providers since 2004 (Figure 9).

5.2. Expenditures at Hospitals

The increase in expenditures at hospitals as a share of all health spending has been considerable during the period 1997–2012. Hospital expenditures covering general as well as teaching hospitals, mental health substance abuse institutions, and specialized hospitals accounts for 30% of THE in 2012 (Table 19). Overall hospital spending increased from Taka 10.5 billion (23% of THE)in 1997 to Taka 44.2 billion in 2007 (29% of THE) and Taka 98 billion (30% of THE) in 2012. This increase was mostly due to increase in expenditures at private hospitals, and consequently the relative shares of expenditures on public and private hospitals have changed significantly during the period 1997-2012. Hospital expenditures covering general as well as teaching hospitals, mental health substance abuse institutions, and specialized hospitals amounted to Taka 98 billion (\$1.1 billion) in 2012 (Table 22).

A comparison between public operated hospitals with private or NGO operated hospitals suggest that until 2001public hospitals were the dominant provider in terms of expenditures (Table 20). In 1997 public hospitals as provider accounted for Taka 7.5 billion which was 71% of total hospitals expenditure. In 2012 the scenario has reversed and expenditure at public hospitals accounts for Taka 29 billion, which is only 30% of total hospital expenditures.

Computerised audited government expenditure data has allowed having a breakdown of public hospitals by type of facilities (Table 21). Majority of government expenditure at hospitals are made through upazila level facilities. In 2012, government expenditure at the upazila level facilities accounted for Taka 13 billion which is 45% of total government expenditure on hospitals. District/General hospitals and Medical College hospitals are the next key beneficiary of government expenditure at the hospital level. As a provider, District/General hospitals expenditure in 2012 was Taka 6.5 billion (22% of total government expenditure on hospitals) while it was Taka 5.8 billion (20% of total government expenditure on hospitals) for Medical College hospitals.

5.3. Expenditures by Ambulatory Care Providers

Ambulatory healthcare providers are primarily involved in providing services directly to outpatients who do not require inpatient care. These services are provided by both the medical health services and public health services. The major providers in this group are general physicians and ambulatory health care centres which includes government. outpatientcentres, general physicians (private practices), dental practice, homeopathic and ayurvedic/unani care practitioners and NGO ambulatory health care centres at district and

upazila level. A total of Taka 49 billion (\$613 million) was spent on such services in 2012 (Table 23). The relative share of general physicians have declined from 49% in 1997 to 37% in 2012 while that of ambulatory health care centres have increased from 36% in 1997 to 46% in 2012.

There has been a structural shift in major metropolitan cities whereby more qualified and specialized physicians offer their services from outpatient health care centres than from retail drug outlets or their private chambers. As a result there has been a significant decline in the percentage share of expenditures for general physicians care providers categorized under the "Medical practices" –category. It has declined from 49% in 1997 to 37% in 2012 (Table 22). Concurrently, share of "Ambulatory health care centres" has increased from 36% in 1997 to 46% in 2012.

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) is the lead institution in conducting public health programs in Bangladesh. In 2012 Taka 6 billion was spent by the ministry under this activity, which constituted 82% of total public health program outlay (Table 23). The role of NGOs too is significant, and their share was 17% (Taka 1.3 billion) in 2012. The involvement of government entities outside MOHFW is relatively nominal, incurring around Taka 61 million in 2012 for promotion of public health activities. During 2001 to 2003 the

respective share of expenditure by MOHFW and NGOs in implementing public health programmes was almost inverse to other periods being studied. NGOs were dominant in administering public health programs whereby they spent more than three fourth of total outlay under this activity. One possible explanation for such deviation is that during 2001-03 the government strategy was to implement most public health programs through NGOs.

6. THE by Geographical Classification

Since NHA3, THE disaggregated by the seven administrative divisions of Bangladesh has been attempted. According to NHA estimates, the percentage distribution of healthcare spending by geographical region has not changed much between 1997 and 2012, except for Dhaka and Chittagong divisions (Table 25). In 2012, health expenditure in Dhaka division was Taka 133 billion translating to 41% of total spending. In 1997, health expenditure in Chittagong division accounted for 27%, a share that has decreased to 21% in 2007 and 18% in 2012. The relative decline in expenditure in Chittagong possibly is due to faster increase in private sector health spending as well as investment in Dhaka division. The relative shares of THE are much lower in Sylhet, Barisal and Rangpur have changed little over time.



Table 26 presents estimates of total per capita spending by division during 1997 – 2012. In 2012, Dhaka division had the highest per capita spending of Taka 2,722 followed by Khulna (Taka 2,371) and Chittagong (Taka 1,930). The lowest per capita spending was in Sylhet division (Taka 1,379). During the period 1997 – 2006 Chittagong division had the highest per capita spending. Barisal, Rangpur and Sylhet had relatively lower per capita expenditure than the other four divisions.

Figure 10: Share of THE and Per Capita THE by Division, 2012






Table 27presents a comparison of government healthcare spending by geographical region. As a percentage share of total government spending on health, in 2012, Dhaka (26%) and Chittagong (18%) are higher and lower in Barisal (8%) and Sylhet (13%). Per capita government outlay however is lowest in Dhaka division – Taka 396 (Table 28) while Chittagong division is the next lowest (Taka 464). Barisal division has the highest per capita public spending (Taka 668) followed by Khulna (Taka 631).

7. Out-of-pocket Expenditure by Households

Out of pocket (OOP) health expenditure by households constitutes the major component of total health spending in Bangladesh. Households spend over Taka 205 million annually on health related goods and services. OOP share in THE has increased from 55.9% in 1997 to 59.9% in 2005 to 63.3% in 2012 (Table 29). A functional breakdown of services suggests that outlay on medical goods comprises the biggest share of OOP (Table 29).

In 2012, households spent Taka 134 billion on pharmaceutical drugs (Table 29). Expenditure on drugs as a percentage of OOP however has declined over time. In 1997, drug outlay was 75.3% of OOP, 70.5% in 2001 and 65% in 2012 (Table 30). Most of the healthcare services provided by the government are for free but households do need to pay a nominal user fee. Such OOP expenditure by the household are reflected as general government administration of health. In 2012 households have paid around Taka 1.4 billion as administration fee which is less than 1% of OOP.




Figure 11: Share of OOP by Function 2012

A breakdown of household out of pocket (OOP) expenditure for 2012 by healthcare functions, shows that almost 65% of OOP is spent on purchasing medicine. During the same period household expenditure on inpatient and outpatient curative was around 11% (Figure 11).

Table 30presents OOP estimates whereby services are further disaggregated. For instance, curative care is categorized into inpatient and outpatient categories. The relative share of inpatient curative care expenditure steadily increased during 1997 to 2004 period, and stabilized at around 11% subsequently. The increase in inpatient curative care spending is arguably due to a combination of higher OOP in private hospitals and greater propensity to use private sector facilities.

Further breakdown of OOP by provider shows that retailer of medicine and medical goods commonly known as "pharmacy" accounts for majority of OOP expenditure. In 1997 household were spending 76% of their OOP expenditure on retail drug outlet which has decreased to 65% in 2012(Table 30). Household OOP expenditure on hospital and ancillary (e.g., diagnostic and imaging) services share has been increasing over the years. In 2012 hospital share in OOP expenditure was 13% which was only 6% in 1997. Ancillary services' share increased from 5% in 1997 and remained steady at 9% since 2004.

8. Revisions to BNHA Estimates, 1997-007

The third round of Bangladesh National Health Accounts (NHA3) provided health care expenditures for the period 1997 – 2007. The fourth round of Bangladesh National Health Accounts (NHA4) offer revised health care expenditure estimates for 1997 – 2007, and new estimates for 2008 – 2012. NHA3 and NHA4 estimates differ for the period 1997 -2007 under each of the major functional categories as well as in Total Health Expenditure (THE) - Table 30.

Several keyfactorshave contributed to the changes in estimated expenditures:

- adoption of SHA2011 guideline into BNHA framework led to creation of new classifications, which resulted in splitting or aggregating some of the healthcare expenditures;
- (ii) a comprehensive, audited and computerized data on actual government expenditure by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) and other government units outlays became available during NHA4 exercise; earlier rounds of NHA was limited to MOHFW expenditure data;
- (iii) improvement in sampling methodology and approach leading to a more reliable and robust estimation of various components of private healthcare expenditures. Compilation of electronic database for Private Hospitals and NGOs with geographical location has not only improved sampling methodology and approach leading to a more reliable and robust estimation but also helped in making revised estimates for previous years.
- (iv) health expenditure data collected from all insurance companies (census), leading to more accurate estimates than hitherto for this sector.

Changes in Estimates

In each year during the period 1997-2007, Total Health Expenditure (THE) is reported lower under NHA4 than under NHA3. For instance, THE for 2007 was estimated at Taka 160.9 billion under NHA3 while NHA4 revised estimate is Taka 153.9 billion (Table 32). Similarly, in 2001, THE was reported as Taka 74.2 billion under NHA3 compared to Taka 71.9 billion based on NHA4 estimates.

Alike THE differences between NHA3 and NHA4, services of curative care were over-reported under NHA3. In 2007, expenditure on curative was estimated at Taka 46 billion and Taka 37 billion under NHA3 and NHA4 respectively. Expenditures on medical goods are estimated to be consistently lower than the earlier estimated reported under NHA3. For example, in 2007 NHA3 claimed that Taka 74.2 billion was spent on drugs, while NHA4 estimated it at Taka 62.4 billion.

Expenditure on ancillary services shows lower outlays for 1997 to 2000 under NHA4 estimation while in subsequent years – 2001 to 2007 – NHA3 estimates were relatively, albeit modestly, lower.

8.1. Revisions to the BNHA Framework

The Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) framework has been revised to adopt System of Health Accounts 2011 (SHA 2011) guideline for National Health Accounts. The revision was done in extensive consultations with key officials of the Government of Bangladesh, relevant development partners and the NHA steering committee. It is based on the SHA framework, but with adaptations and modifications to suite Bangladeshi needs and circumstances. Nevertheless, these adaptations and modifications have been implemented in such a way as to allow cross-mapping of BNHA estimates to the SHA1 and SHA 2011 framework.

A standardized coding procedure has been adopted in this version of the BNHA framework. The alphabet "B" has been added to each of the ICHA codes across all the SHA tables. For example, SHA 2011 identifies curative care with the code HC.1; the Bangladesh NHA code is BHC.1. This approach allows easy referral to the SHA 2011 document for conceptual and definitional explanations and reference.

A further extension of the discussion on healthcare financing scheme is the classification of revenue of financing schemes. Understanding and tracking revenue generation source can be of considerable importance to policy makers when deciding on alternate financing schemes for the country's health care system. Classifying revenue by schemes allows tracking of methods applied in revenue-raising and permits identification of institutions that are involved in the process. This exercise allows understanding the respective role and share of the public and private financing. Also, who bears the burden of financing the schemes is identified.

As mentioned earlier, classification of revenues of health care financing schemes is a new category in the BNHA estimation. The description of the activities, sub-classification and the coding (with the alphabet "B" being added to each ICHA codes) match identically between BNHA-FS and ICHA-FS.

8.2. Revisions in Data Sources and Estimation Methods

The formation of a BNHA cell at the Health Economics Unit (HEU) of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) has ensured active participation of the HEU staff in data collation, data cleaning, and analysis. A direct benefit of this institutionalization has been witnessed in analysis of public health program of the government. National Health Accounts (NHA) estimates generated under this round has more accurate functional classification compared to earlier rounds of NHA.

Under BNHA4 a more robust sampling and estimation technique was applied for private hospitals, diagnostic facilities and for NGOs that are actively involved in providing healthcare services. The Health Economics Unit (HEU) compiled a list of private clinics/hospitals and diagnostic facilities (both registered and unregistered) through the Civil Surgeons² (CS) of the 64 districts except Dhaka city. The CS listing was then matched with the list of registered private clinics/hospitals and diagnostic facilities obtained from the Directorate General of Health Services³ (DGHS). As there were discrepancies between the listings provided by the CS and DGHS, field investigators physically validated the combined list by visiting the listed entities in four major cities⁴, where about 28% of the private clinics/hospitals from the combined list are located. About 90% of the registered private clinics/hospitals and diagnostic facilities from the combined list were found.

The NHA team was able to use an electronic dataset of registered NGOs from the Social Welfare Ministry⁵. This list was matched with the listing obtained from the NGO Affairs Bureau. The NGOs registered with the latter are those that receive foreign funding. A sample of the combined listing of NGOs was then physically checked in three district headquarters⁶, where 44% of NGOs listed are located. All NGOs registered under the NGO Bureau⁷ found to be in-operation. However, the NGOs registered under the Social Welfare Ministry were difficult to locate - approximately 20% of the NGOs could not be traced.

These efforts of validations have strengthened the sampling frame considerably that allowed producing a more reliable and accurate expenditure estimates for the private as well as NGO health service providers. These ultimately contributed towards significantly improving the estimates for the households' out-of-pocket expenditure.

Like all previous BNHA, analyses of medicine expenditure by the households were conducted using data from multiple sources including IMS, MOHFW's Drug Administration Department and from the Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS). BNHA4 have improvised the analysis of medicine expenditure by separating out the households own purchase of medicine and medicine expenditure that they have incurred in a private hospital. This breakdown of expenditure has precluded double counting of medicine expenditure reported by households.

As mentioned earlier, for the first time under BNHA4, a census of insurance companies offering health insurance services was conducted. Earlier some of the large insurance companies did not participate in a NHA survey, and therefore guess-estimates were made about their health outlay. Under NHA4, with assistance from the Insurance Development and Regulatory Authority (IDRA) all insurance companies offering health insurance participated in the BNHA survey.

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



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1. Background

In the preceding National Health Accounts (NHA) estimation efforts in Bangladesh, mapping exercises were undertaken for each form of health expenditure (whether by source, provider or function), linking a SHA-coded activity with a unique Bangladesh code (reference: Bangladesh NHA3 report, Annex I and Annex II).

OECD's <u>A System of Health Accounts 2000</u> and the WHO led work on a <u>National Health Accounts Producer Guide</u> served as key documents in the mapping exercise and in building the Bangladesh National Health (BNHA) framework. Those documents were used intensively to ensure that the internationally accepted concepts, definitions and methods of estimation were adhered to.

The revised <u>System of Health Accounts</u> (SHA 2011) is the new global standard for producing health expenditure accounts. SHA 2011 offers a more comprehensive and policy linked discourse in tracking resource flows from sources to uses. Countries across the world that are constructing or updating NHA estimates need to follow SHA 2011 to ensure quality control in estimation approach and conforming international comparability. This note highlights the major changes and additions in classification made by SHA 2011 and its integration into the Bangladesh National Health Accounts (BNHA) framework.

2. Revisions and Integration under NHA4

National Health Accounts (NHA) historically has been presented on a three-dimensional classification system (ICHA), which had three axes: health care financing (ICHA-HF), health care functions (ICHA-HC) and health care service providers (ICHA-HP). To develop a BNHA framework that is compatible to the OECD SHA classification, a mapping exercise was undertaken under the preceding Bangladesh National Health Accounts, commonly cited as the third round of Bangladesh National Accounts.

The System of Health Accounts (SHA) 2011 suggests revisions and inclusion of different concepts, definitions, and estimation procedures. Notwithstanding those revisions, SHA 2011 introduces <u>four</u>additional dimensions to the NHA framework: (i)Classification of Health Care Financing Schemes (HF); (ii)Classification of Revenues of Health Care Financing Schemes (FS); Classification of Factors of Health Care Provision (FP) and Capital Formation in Health System (HK). All four additions are significantly policy relevant.

This document presents a revised and updated BNHA framework in a tabular form. A total of <u>sevengroups</u> – three from the original three-way classification of health care financing (HF), health care functions (HC) and health care service providers (HP) and the four new ones listed in the preceding paragraph. SHA 2011 also introduces **Memorandum Items**under the different classifications, which have been created to allow further analysis of policy and resource allocation.

SHA 2011 limits the Total Expenditure on Health (TEH) to current expenditure on health care which is "final consumption expenditure of resident units on health care goods and services."

Capital formation is treated as an investment, thereby delineating it as an explicit activity. Research and development as well as education and training are viewed as not part of final consumption, and included under capital account. BNHA definition of the TEH differs from SHA 2011 definitions and adheres to the SHA 1.0 definitions where aggregates of "current expenditure on health" and "gross capital formation" are summed to arrive at TEH

SHA 2011 refines functional classifications by trying to isolate consumption, investment and provision categories further strengthening the efficacy of the tri-axial approach. Hence it makes a concerted effort to isolate preventive care from its source of provision or financing. Also, preventive care is distinguished from curative care.

Memorandum items have been introduced into SHA 2011 which can benefit policy analysis and resource allocation. It identifies policy relevant categories that may not necessarily be through a specific HC class or the activity may be beyond the health care definitional boundary.

3. Mapping of BNHA and ICHA Classification

Alike earlier framework building exercise, the mapping effort entailed matching each SHA-coded activity to a unique Bangladesh code. It is understood that the BNHA framework presented in this report is a fluid document. In the coming months, as NHA related data are collated and collected, and discussions held between the BNHA cell and other experts, further refinement and revisions will be incorporated into this document. The BHC classification system has been developed following consultation with relevant resource persons and agencies.

A standardized coding procedure has been adopted in this version of the BNHA framework. The letter "B" has been added to each of the ICHA codes across all the SHA tables. For example, SHA 2011 identifies curative care with the code HC.1; the Bangladesh NHA code is BHC.1. This approach allows easy referral to the SHA 2011 document for conceptual and definitional explanations. However, there is one exception to this adoption of coding procedure where BNHA healthcare functions have incorporated capital formation as part of its reporting items.

3.1 Health Care Functions (HC)

Health care functions imply the types of goods and services provided and activities performed within the health accounts boundary. Functional outlay refers to current spending on health care and therefore relates to consumption and therefore excludes investment outlays. Accordingly such expenditure as research and development, education and training are not considered as health care functions and treated as "Memorandum items". Components of health expenditure that lie beyond the health care boundary are targeted through two different memorandum categories. These are termed reporting items and health care-related classes, respectively.

3.1.1. Reporting Items

Items that fall within the health care boundaries but not fully disaggregated as separate categories on their own may also have strong analytical relevance are treated as "Reporting

Items". For example direct expenditure on medicine and pharmaceutical good are classified as a separate class (HC.5.1) but this does not include medicines consumed by inpatient at the hospitals. For policy making decision it is useful to have total expenditure figure on pharmaceutical consumption, thus a separate reporting item comprising all pharmaceutical consumption is proposed under the SHA2011.

3.1.2. Health Care-Related Classes

Expenditure that includes both health care component as well as the social care component is vital for the purpose of resource allocation. The classification therefore suggests some additional health care-related classes that allow the construction of relevant indicators to sum up the non-health and health components. Health care related classification is useful in classifying, for example, HIVAIDS related expenditure where expenditure on social services and cash benefits is offered as part of long-term care expenditure.

3.2 Classification of Bangladesh Health Care Functions (BHC)

Consistent with the SHA 2011 approach, all health care expenditures are categorized by core health care functions include such activities as: curative care, rehabilitative and, long-term care, medical goods, preventive care, health system and financing administration (Table HC). Under SHA 2011, Memorandum items have been identified separately which will allow policy related analysis. These include expenditure on drugs, long term care, and health promotion activities.

3.3 Health Care Financing

Health financing encompasses financing schemes, their revenues, and the institutional unit (financing agents). Earlier NHA framework did not allow a clear demarcation or subclassification and tracking of funding sources, revenue generation and the role of institutions. SHA 2011 offers an explicit breakdown of health financing into the three components. Whilst the financing agent concept remains unchanged under SHA 2011, it introduces two additional components: (i) Classification of Health Financing Schemes (HF), and (ii) Classification of Revenues of Health Care Financing Scheme (FS).

3.3.1. Classification of Bangladesh Health Care Financing Schemes (BHF)

The structure of the health financing system under SHA 2011 advocates (i) measuring expenditure of health care financing schemes, under which goods and services are purchased directly from health care providers; and (ii) the types of revenues of health care financing schemes. Health care financing schemes are of two categories: (i) financing schemes (e.g. social health insurance, voluntary insurance) and (ii) institutional units (e.g. financing agents, private insurance companies).

Several specific entities or institutions have been identified for Bangladesh who offers health care financing schemes. This includes the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) and government employee programmes (Table HF).

3.3.2. Classification of Bangladesh Financing Agents (BFA)

Financing agents include institutions that pool health resources collected from different sources, as well as entities, such as households and firms that pay directly for health care from their own resources. Financing agents are typically grouped into two mutually exclusive institutional sectors: (i) Public and (ii) Private. This broad grouping of sectors corresponds both to general national income accounting practice as well as for NHA estimation.

The cross classification between the ICHA FA and BNHA FA (Table FA) reveals that names of specific ministries of the government having health expenditure have been identified.

3.3.3. Classification of Revenues of Health Care Financing Schemes (BFS)

A further extension of the discussion on health care financing scheme is the classification of revenue of financing schemes. Understanding and tracking revenue generation source can be of considerable importance to policy makers when deciding on alternate financing schemes for the country's health care system. Classifying revenue by schemes allows tracking of methods applied in revenue-raising and permits identification of institutions that are involved in the process. This exercise allows understanding the respective role and share of the public and private financing. Also, who bears the burden of financing the schemes is identified.

As mentioned earlier, classification of revenues of health care financing schemes is a new category in the BNHA estimation. The description of the activities, sub-classification and the coding (with the alphabet "B" being added to each ICHA codes) match identically between BNHA-FS and ICHA-FS (Table FS).

3.4 Health Care Providers (HP)

Health care providers are entities that provide health care goods and services as their primary activity, as well as those for which health care provision is only one among a number of activities within the health accounts definitional boundary. The classification of health care providers (ICHA-HP) serves the purpose therefore of categorizing all organizations that contribute to the provision of health care goods and services, by arranging country-specific provider units into common, internationally applicable categories.

Health care providers are broadly grouped into three types: primary, secondary and health administration. Primary health care provider is defined as Hospitals (HP.1), Residential long-

term care facilities (HP.2), Ambulatory care providers (HP.3), Ancillary services providers (HP.4), Retailers and other providers of medical goods (HP.5), and Preventive care providers (HP.6). Secondary providers furnish health services in addition to their principal activity which not necessarily is related to health.

3.4.1. Classification of Bangladesh Health Care Providers (BHP)

In this round of NHA, BNHA classification for primary providers has been categorized into six types (Table HP; BHP.1 – BHP.6). With the objective of making the BNHA framework attending to local institutional arrangements of health service provision, and more useful for policy analysis, further disaggregation of the cited six primary providers have been introduced. For example, all general hospitals under SHA 2011 is classified as HP.1.1. The BNHA links HP.1.1 with several sub-classifications including: government medical college and university hospitals (BHP.1.1.1.1); MoHFW medical college hospitals (BHP.1.1.1.1.1) and private medical college hospitals (BHP.1.1.1.2).

3.5 Factors of Health Care Provision

The main aim of the classification of factors of health provision is the assigning of all types of resources to health care activities. Health care providers deliver not only health care. They also provide some products that are outside the health care boundary. For ICHA classifications, the target is to isolate and restrict the core component of all classifications to the health care boundary. This is also the case for the classification of factors of health care provision. Inputs used to provide activities outside the health care boundary, for example social services, cosmetic surgery or any exported health services, should be separated, and reported separately if this is of interest for national policy analysis. These could be shown as Factor of Provision-related components.

3.5.1. Classification of Bangladesh Factors of Health Care Provision (BFP)

Health provisions include different types of wage and non-wage benefits to a major factor of production – labor. Table FP lists the different categories of health care provisions where all SHA 2011 listed components have been identically matched with a BNHA code. The BNHA code can be treated as provisional at this stage. Based on availability of data and further discussion on the definitional appropriateness, sub-classification or aggregation of BNHA-FP codes may be required.

3.6 Capital Formation in Health System (HK)

Capital Formation in Health System (HK) is relevant for policy makers and analysts to know how much a health system is investing in infrastructure, machinery and equipment. Although health systems are still part of a highly capital intensive sector, over the recent decades capital has been increasingly important as a factor of production of health services. The availability of statistics on capital is vital to the analysis of the health system's production capacity. Information on capital could also contribute to the estimation of productivity, capital intensity and rates of return.

3.6.1. Classification of Capital Formation in Health System (BHK)

The definitions for Capital Formation in health for Bangladesh NHA are no different from the SHA 2011. Alike SHA 2011, aggregate "gross capital formation" for BNHA is measured by the sum of the following three components: gross fixed capital formation (e.g. hospital buildings or ambulances); changes in inventories (e.g. vaccinations kept in stock); and acquisitions less disposals of valuables (e.g. artworks). Gross fixed capital is generally the most pertinent component. Assets legally owned by the health care providers are only included under capital formation.

Gross fixed capital formation in the health care system is calculated by measuring the total value of the fixed assets that health providers have acquired during the accounting period (less the value of the disposals of assets). To be eligible for being a component of gross fixed capital formation, these fixed assets have to be used repeatedly or continuously for more than one year in the production of health services. Assets by definition are "stores of values," or means of carrying forward values from one period to another. Fixed assets can be termed as "fixed" if and only if they can be used repeatedly or continuously in production for more than one year. Goods that are usable only once (e.g. coal), even if physically highly durable, are not considered as fixed assets. Examples of fixed assets in health sector include, amongst other things, ambulances, hospital buildings and medical imaging machines.

As evident in Table HK, the two major categories are Gross Capital Formation (refer: BHK1 and HK.1) and Non-produced non-financial assets (refer: BHK 2 and HK.1). Memorandum items include loans, savings and public partnership.
